Objectives and competences:

	<p>This course will deal with legal relations between life partners and between parents and children. The relations will be considered in the light of European Convention of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms and other legal documents which lay down a minimum standard for the national family law regulation. Special attention will be paid to the influence of these documents on family law systems of the countries of the European Community. In the end of the course students will be able to use basic research methodological instruments and also to analyse case-law of national judicial bodies and of the European Court of Human Rights.</p>
